The per capita giving of our church members is the highest in Canada, if not North America. I praise God for the faithfulness of His people. As we return our tithe into the storehouse, the Lord blesses us so that we are able to give offerings for the support of the work around the world as well as here in Alberta—for your local church and for the work throughout the Alberta Conference.

We have had housing challenges in Alberta to keep up with the high cost of living in this province. If you have moved here from outside the province you will realize that the cost of housing takes a huge chunk of your income. Our cities are faced with a tremendous challenge to find shelter for those who are not able to meet the housing challenge on their own.

The higher water table that has flooded some of your basements has also had an impact on your conference office since May. We have been challenged in this short labour market to find people or businesses to follow through on their commitment to come fix our problem. If there is an expert in this field that you know of, please share that information with me.

As we approach the end of the year, we look forward to the goals and projects that need to be accomplished in the New Year. Look at our Foothills Camp—we see that our washrooms need some major repairs. We could use another lodge, this time with washrooms in every room. That would be a great benefit throughout the year as well as at camp meeting.

I would like to see greater emphases on evangelism. We need major city-wide evangelistic meetings every year in either Edmonton or Calgary. The rest of the cities, towns, and hamlets need to have on going evangelistic outreach programs.

Some of the new groups that are starting up around the conference could use the help of a Bible worker to assist the pastor serving in that area to strengthen the new members. If the Lord impresses you that you could help in a small way or with something more substantial, please let me know so that I can help you find a project that would maximize the work in Alberta.

I thank you for your giving this year. To October 31, 2007, there is an 8.95% increase in Tithe (down slightly from 2006), a 13.2% increase in Sabbath School, a 13.8% increase in Missions, and a 7.2% increase in Alberta Advance.

As we approach this Christmas season, let us remember the real meaning of why we celebrate during this time of the year. God took a risk and sent His Son into this world to redeem us—that is what we should truly celebrate.

60th Wedding **Anniversary**



were divided into groups, about 40 in each, and sent to the five different sites throughout Ecuador. Four of our teens participated in this incredible experience: Aurora Davis, Kendra Hill, Jaden Rajah, and Kayla Ritchey. Here is what some shared –

The adventure started at the airport. Everyone flew down separately and met at Quito, Ecuador. The staff were there clapping and cheering for us when we came out of the airport. It was neat. The first day was spent together as a big group. The next morning, we split up into our different site groups, loaded the buses, and then drove to our different sites. I was at the San Carlos site, 6 hours away from Quito.

The scenery was amazing. There were high, lush mountains and beautiful waterfalls. We arrived at our site that evening. We stayed in a school, and the church site was right next door. The site consisted of a cement pad, a baptistery wall, and a skeleton frame. We started construction on Friday and spent seven days working on the church. We managed to get all the outside walls up

and part of the roof on. It was exciting to see a building where there wasn't one two weeks before. The church was packed on the final Sabbath. Most of the kids from the VBS program came. In San Carlos there was only one family in the town that was Adventist. Seeing a packed church was a real blessing.

On the final Friday we went to a "water park" with the kids from the school. They gave us bags of fruit as a thank-you. They had so little, and they gave us what little they could spare. It was very touching.

One spiritual experience that stands out in my mind is the Passion Play that we presented. We started with the Last Supper, and then paraded Jesus through the streets of the city, yelling and shouting. We ended off at our newly-built church, and had a Crushing of the Rose ceremony. Most everybody gave a testimony, and there were tears all around. I'm sure

everybody spent the night deep in thought and prayer.

The day before it was time to leave, the whole group got back together again at a beach. It was very hard to say good-bye to everyone when it was time to go home. It's amazing how a bunch of people who don't even know each other can become such good friends in just two weeks. Ecuador was an incredible experience, and I believe many lives were touched. It is something that I definitely would do again.

For the first three days, we got to meet everyone and stay in a nice hotel in the capitol city of Quito, Ecuador. On the third day we got split up into groups and were sent five different directions to our sites. I went to Las Mercedes, which was nine hours away, from Quito. Did I mention that it was VERY hot and humid? The only other person that I knew from Canada was Roderick Stickle. I took a chance and met a lot of new friends that I still stay in contact with.

We set up camp with our tents on a basketball court and made a 'tent city', which for the next week and a half became my home. I became good friends with a girl I met on the bus named Amanda Johnson. Our Las Mercedes group definitely was close and crazy. We did a VBS for the Las Mercedes kids, (with our highest count at 200 kids!!), we did outreach for the community and built the Las Mercedes people a church. We also were fortunate to be in one of the two groups that were doing

a medical clinic (I was very lucky because I want to be a nurse when I grow up). On Wednesday we got to go on an expedition to a water park and go out for pizza (which was a nice change from beans and rice for me), a really fun memorable trip.

Friday night the staff set up an Agape feast for us. It was so pretty; there was a full table of food, tables in the shape of a cross, lit by candlelight. After we ate, people gave their testimonies.

I had a chance to help out with so many things that I liked—the church, medical clinic, outreach, and VBS during my trip to Las Mercedes. I had the most AWESOME time EVER! I met so many new friends, that I miss so much. There's so much stuff to remember, so much fun, and so much loving of God. I can't really describe what it was like for me to go, but I know it changed my life seeing how the people of Las Mercedes live. It has given me a whole new appreciation for God. Pastor Morris presented the Bible lessons based on what foods God allowed people to eat at creation, when meat was added to the diet, and what will be eaten in




A Year Has Come and Gone



Evangelism Initiatives – 'Nothing new under the sun' – and the fire still burns!

This year the Fort McMurray Church voted to conduct four Prophecy Seminars in 2007 and four seminars in 2008. Our evangelistic plan was to emulate the S.T.A.F.

(South Tulsa Adventist Fellowship) experience which has grown from 27 members in 2000 to over 600 new members this year. The S.T.A.F. plan was to hold five prophecy seminars per year, baptizing 100 new members as a result. The population of Tulsa is 400,000, and they send out 100,000 handbills at each seminar.

The population of Fort McMurray is 70,000, 1/5th the size of Tulsa, and we are mailing 20,000 handbills at each seminar. I calculated that if S.T.A.F. can baptize 100 per year from five seminars then we should have 20 baptisms per year from at least four prophecy seminars. Our third seminar began September 21 with about 35 visitors attending. After three seminars, we have baptized 12 precious souls and three baptismal decisions from the third seminar.

Our fourth seminar begins Nov 30 and will run for two weeks. On the first weekend we will cover eight topics between Friday evening and all day Sabbath, then nightly for two weeks.

One young married couple with a newborn, Chris and Ashley Richards, attended a recent church business meeting and shared with the group that "this church has changed our lives forever, and we are so grateful." Then she concurred with a majority vote that "we continue to do aggressive evangelism in Fort McMurray." It was an emotional moment.

Every new member is a miracle, and we have yet to see what is next for Fort McMurray. But, by the Grace of God, we look forward to the next wave of new on-fire believers into our circle of love and friendship. I'm learning from all this that 'There's nothing new under the sun.' The figures are the same across the board—'If you work evangelism, evangelism will work for you.'



From Hockey to Belize


One new member, Clayton Wheppler, was settling into a high caliber hockey career with the Fort McMurray

Year End Donation Planning

As an Alberta Donor, you have both Federal and Provincial Tax Credits that serve to reduce your taxable income, as follows:

- The Canadian Government Federal Tax Credit of 17% on the first \$200 of charitable donations, plus 29% of gifts in excess of \$200;
- The Alberta Provincial Tax Credit as of January 1, 2007 of 21% on gifts in excess of \$200;
- Combined, as of January 1, 2007, the Federal Tax Credit and the Alberta Provincial Tax Credit is a credit of 50 cents for each dollar of donations in excess of \$200.
- Donors can claim maximum annual charitable contributions equal to 75% of their annual income.
- Charitable contributions in excess of the annual limit can be carried forward 5 succeeding years to reduce taxes payable in future years.

Canada Revenue Agency requires that all donations for 2007 Tax Receipts must be in the hands of your local Church Treasurer, or the Conference Vice President for Finance, or postmarked no later than December 31, 2007.

What Can I Give to the Master?

You may wish to consider making a gift for a special charitable purpose, such as Evangelism, Education, Foothills Camp, Personal Ministries, Men's or Women's Ministries, Adventist Community Services, Mamawi Atosketan Native School, or another conference or church department or project that is close to your heart. Here are some ways to make your gift:

- A Gift of Cash.
- A gift of Publicly Listed Securities this results in Zero Capital Gains Tax if the security is <u>transferred</u> to the conference and not cashed before it is given.

How to Build Churches and Schools Quickly

Just give a Toonie-A-Week

The slogan above was coined during the presentation of the Toonie-A-Week presentation during camp meeting at Foothills Camp in July of this year. The goal was to encourage each member to contribute just two dollars per week towards supporting the building program of the Alberta Conference. At present, 25 out of the 73 congregations in the Alberta Conference do not have their own church buildings for their worship services. They are meeting in rented facilities.

The Alberta Conference makes provision in the annual budget of \$30,000 to subsidize church and school building projects, and according to policy one church can apply for a maximum of \$10,000 of this subsidy. At the end of the third quarter our membership in the Alberta Conference stands at 9,399. If only one-third of our members will commit to give willingly two dollars per week, at the end of one year we would realize \$325,832 for the church and school building project. When this happens the maximum subsidy a church can apply for is \$100,000. Isn't this great?

We gave to each pastor at camp meeting time some cards (see sample) where each member can place toonie coins in the slots provided. Some churches are using them but in many churches those card have not been distributed yet. We encourage all churches to please distribute them.

You do not have to use the cards; you can write a cheque for this project. My wife and I choose to just write a cheque every month for this project. At present the total collection is a little over \$5,000. New churches are being planted, and we need houses of worship for them. Please do plan to participate in this worthy cause. It is still true that "God loves a cheerful giver."
