From the President ...

Every Member Faithful



The Executive Committee of the Alberta Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church has recently considered and adopted an organization Vision and Mission Statement. It is most appropriate for it to have done so as every organization should have a clear idea of its objectives and how it wishes to accomplish the same.

The Vision is very succinctly stated. It is "Every Member Faithful." These three brief words encapsulate the full sphere of Christian life. This Vision Statement includes what is the desired goal of the Alberta Conference for its

membership in their relationship with their God and with their fellow man.

The relationship with God can be demonstrated in faithfulness in Bible study, in prayer, in family worship, in church attendance, in sharing of one's faith with others, and in Christian stewardship, etc. It will call for taking time for God and recognizing the role He has in one's personal life. We can be so busy in our daily pursuits that we have little time for God and as a result our relationship with Him is distant and our faithfulness in responding to His love is weak. "If ye love me, keep my commandments" said Jesus (John 14: 15). As we grow closer in our relationship with Him and our love for Him increases, so will our ability to do His will improve.

The relationship with fellow human beings will be demonstrated in being faithful in our domestic situations (e.g. family relationships), faithful in our community relationships, faithful in our employment responsibilities, and faithful in our humanitarian considerations.

The Mission Statement is also quite brief and we hope to the point. It is "To Proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ by Serving, Teaching and Preaching." It is the Gospel of Jesus that affects changes in human hearts making the recipient faithful to God and to relationships here on earth. Every conference administrator, pastor, teacher, and church member can find a part to play in this proclamation. It is our desire that our various church activities and programs will in one way or another "Proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ." Every day it should be our prayer that God will give us the opportunity to serve, to teach, or to preach that day in a way that someone may become acquainted with the Jesus we know.

As we consider the Vision and Mission Statement of the Alberta Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church let us not do so in just the corporate sense. I would urge every church member in the Alberta Conference to personalize these words and ask ones self how they can be applied in your life. After all, in the words of Jesus, "He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much...." (Luke 16:10) When Jesus comes, will He find faithfulness among the members of the Alberta Conference?

Many Alberta Conference members and friends must be experiencing increased blessings as a result of returning the Lord's Tithe and giving generous offerings throughout 2005.

Approximately 20% of the 2005 Alberta Conference Tithe increase can be attributed to church growth, whereas an estimated 80% of the Tithe increase is a result of members and friends returning more Tithe to the Lord. Interestingly, there are no estimated increases from Adventist church members moving into the province,

because during 2005, the same number of church members moved out of the province as moved into the province.

It is estimated that 12% of the total Alberta Advance Offerings increase came from an increase in members added to the church during 2005, leaving 88% of the increase attributable to increased giving by members and friends. A goal of the conference is to double Alberta Advance Offerings to care for the many services to members and friends provided through this offering. An increase of 25.61% during 2005 is a significant step toward doubling Alberta Advance Offerings. Please prayerfully consider another increase during 2006.

The increased gifts to Missions and to the ADRA Annual Appeal are also very much appreciated and will bring God's love and care to many.

May we all experience the Joy of Giving to the Lord's ministries as we give according to the blessings entrusted to us.

THE SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH REVOLVING FUND

The following article is reprinted with permission from the Canadian Adventist Messenger, February 2006. It highlights the opportunity of investing in a church fund that makes loans to Adventist churches and schools, thereby reducing the interest cost to church projects, while still providing a modest return to investors.

The fund is totally administered by the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada but application forms are also available from the Alberta Conference Treasury Department.

A Trust document that may or may not be used accompanies each investment application. If used, the Trust document specifies how the investment funds are to be distributed upon the death of the investor. If the Trust document is not used, the investment funds become part of the estate of the investor.

Revolving Fund Questions and Answers

John Ramsay, Treasurer of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada, answers some common questions regarding the Revolving Fund.

- Q. For those who are not familiar with the Revolving Fund, could you explain the purpose of the fund.
- **A.** The Revolving Fund was established to assist the Canadian field with loans to upgrade existing churches and schools, build new ones, or purchase others, and for lines of credit in conferences and institutions.

We are grateful to those who through the years have invested in the Revolving Fund. At October 31, 2005, the Revolving Fund had \$15,203,580 in deposits. There are currently approximately 500 depositors and the majority of the deposits are loaned out to 50 churches and schools at a relatively low rate of interest. We have reached the point where we need more deposits if we want to provide for future loan requests.

- Q. How are the specific funds that I deposit used?
- **A.** Your funds are recorded according to the conference you are from, and are allocated for loans in that conference.
- Q. What is the rate of interest on Revolving Fund deposits and how is it paid?
- A. The interest rate paid on deposits is somewhat less than can be secured from public institutions, but you have the satisfaction of knowing that your money is being used to help carry forward the work in Canada. God's blessing will attend this kind of program.

The Revolving Fund currently pays 2.5% interest on deposits; and loans it out to the churches and schools at 4.5%. Interest rates are reviewed periodically by the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada and adjusted based on current market conditions. One administrative salary is taken out of the 2% difference and the balance is returned to the conferences based on the funds on deposit from each conference at December 31 each year.

The interest you earn can be handled in three ways: it can be credited to your account and compounded semi-annually; interest cheques can be issued to you semi-annually on June 30 and December 31; or the interest can be given as a donation to the charity of your choice.

- Q. Will depositors be able to withdraw funds from their account as needed?
- A. Depositors naturally wonder if they can get their deposits back when they need the funds. The answer is yes. All deposits in the Revolving Fund are accepted with the understanding that you can get your money back by giving thirty days notice. However, in case of an emergency, the deposits can be returned immediately upon receipt of a written request. Deposits in the Revolving Fund are not insured by any agency of the government. However, reserves have been put in place by the local Conferences in accordance with General Conference policy, thus protecting depositors against any loss. Additionally, all loans made from the Fund are guaranteed by the local Conferences and if the Revolving Fund requires repayment earlier than the repayment schedule, the loan shall become due and payable within 90 days through the securing of a loan from another source.
- Q. What advantage is it to me to open an account with the Revolving Fund?
- **A.** The greatest blessing of the Revolving Fund is that the members of the church can have their money supporting the Adventist work in Canada. They have their emergency and extra dollars invested in the Lord's work and thus in a ready position for the coming of the Lord. If Jesus returns before these dollars are needed, the money has not been a lost talent.
- Q. How do I go about setting up a Revolving Fund Account?
- A. If making a deposit to the Revolving Fund fits into your financial picture, you can either contact your local conference office or send a cheque payable to the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada, Attention: Revolving Fund, 1148 King Street East, Oshawa, Ontario L1H 1H8. The necessary documents will be prepared and sent to you by mail.

They are now a part of God's Remnant Church of Bible Prophecy due to the preaching of the gospel by Pastor Justis St. Hilaire at the Sandman Hotel.

These wonderful results of God's Spirit did not happen without tremendous effort and sacrifice on behalf of the Edmonton Central congregation and pastoral staff of John Wesley and Tyler Rosengren.

Some thoughts on serving God in His temple

It has been said that 5% of the congregation in a given church do all the work. The other 95%, these over-worked children of God believe, find it easy to lean back and make suggestions of how things could be better.

This letter is to all who see themselves as part of the 95%, or the wallpaper on the walls, who come to Sabbath School and Church feeling they have no important contribution to make.

Have you ever wondered what important thing you can do in this body of Christ? Here are some strategies that have worked for me:

- 1. Study your Sabbath School lesson and think how you can share what you have learned.

 Maybe there is some point that gave you a wonderful ah-ha insight, or perhaps you don't really agree with a point, or you could expand on that idea.
- 2. Start a prayer group, or join the one already existing that meets before Sabbath School. This group, in our church, prays earnestly that the Holy Spirit will meet with us to inspire, direct and comfort. If you are unable to come early, privately pray that what is done and said will be a blessing to yourself and to others.
- 3. Share with, and listen to members of the Sabbath School class, believing that God has made you an important part of an important group, and that it is also your responsibility to nourish His children. What you share may be exactly what God wanted someone else to understand.
- 4. Pray for each person|group who leads out—the praise group, the one who offers the main prayer, and the one who presents the sermon. Pray for the Pastor. He carries a heavy load, and only God can give him strength. Choose to believe that each presenter is God's child and as such has been given to the body so that you and others will be blessed. Believe that this is true.

- 5. If you are impaired musically, still mouth the words, staying with the tune as you can. These words will sustain you and build you for the future. If you really want to emphasize your love/admiration/commitment to the Redeemer lift your hand toward heaven, pouring out your love to Him. He understands anyway, but it emphasizes the point in your own mind and heart and helps to liberate you from the deadly donothing mentality.
- 6. During the sermon, give the speaker eye contact, a nod, some quiet response to let him/her know that you heard, are listening or just to encourage. If you disagree with a point in the sermon, thank God for bringing it to your attention through whatever instrument. Thank God for the speaker—remembering that truth is an ever expanding eternal net in its goals and being.
- 7. When the Pastor makes a call for commitment, praise to God, or for any other reason, listen carefully. Then take this important opportunity to respond, making public your commitment/praise/belief in or love for God. This commitment "grows" you,
- 8. After responding to the blessing at the end of the church service, shake the pastor's hand thanking him for his ministry. Then choose at least three people who you don't already relate to: shake their hands, give them a hug; let them know that you are aware that they are also a part of the body of Christ.
- Eventually choose someone you don't know well and invite that person to your home. Share with him/her about your love for Jesus.

These suggestions are self-evident, but perhaps not often thought about. Go home believing that you have served God in the Sabbath School and Church services. He has a place on this earth for you as surely as He has a place in Heaven.

The enrollment increased this year to 17 students, with the implementation of two factors. One was to focus on the ECS program and early grades and concentrate on making them

exceptional. The other was to make the tuition for the school FREE. Once again the Lord has truly blessed this school. The enrollment nearly doubled! A Tuition Replacement Fund was developed in the budget to try and make up for the shortfall that would result from not charging tuition. Half way through the school year the fund has

grown to a balance higher than if tuition had been charged the standard way. Praise God!

Retirees

Blake Retirement

As of January 1, 2006, Pastor and Mrs. Blake have retired from regular pastoral work, most recently with the Bentley church, but are continuing their specialized ministry to deaf people as before their 'official

retirement.

Blake's began pastoring in 1964 in the Bridgewater area of Nova Scotia. John had just finished his theology training at CUC and Alberta had completed one year of teaching church school in Silver Creek BC. Blake's spent their first nine years of pastoral work in the Maritimes including working with the building of two new churches, one in Zealand NB and the other in New Glasgow NS.

Blake's then spent eight years with the BC Conference pastoring in the Trail/Nelson/Grand Forks area, and in McBride. After their work in the BC Conference, they moved to Arkansas where Pastor Blake became Director of the *Christian Deaf Center*, an independent Adventist ministry for deaf students. Alberta taught her two deaf teenagers and others who joined for the three years spent at the Center. Here Blake's deaf daughter, Judy, found herself as a 'deaf person!'

In 1985 Blake's moved to Alberta where John spent two years in independent Deaf Ministry while Alberta interpreted the for their daughter in her first year of classes at PAA and then the following year at Red Deer College for some deaf students. Blake's then spent seven years in regular ministry in the Beauvallon/Bonnyville district and the St. Albert/Onoway districts. During this time Alberta organized the first Mini Campmeeting for the Deaf held in Hope BC during the regular BC camp meeting. In 1994 they began combining both deaf ministry and regular pastoral ministry with Onoway, and more recently while pastoring the Bentley church. They worked from ½ - ¾ time in deaf ministry, but though counted as 'full time' workers, worked without salary for deaf ministry. They very much appreciated adequate help with travel and full credit toward retirement!

Blake's have three daughters, the middle one being deaf. They also adopted a deaf son to be a companion to their deaf daughter. Mrs. Blake, after an intense year of training at the deaf school in Amhurst NS, added a "Teacher of the Deaf" diploma to her education training at CUC which later

enabled her to teach her own deaf children. (Their deaf daughter became deaf at the age of three months from a high fever after contacting chicken pox.) Blake's believe that

God called them to their special ministry as a whole new world opened to them – the world of deafness.

Blake's have worked in the preparation of Easy English materials for deaf, sign language video and DVD materials for deaf, and have helped coordinate deaf ministry in Toronto, here in Alberta, and for 19 years a Canadian Mini-Camp Meeting for Deaf people during the BC Camp Meeting.

A recent project has been a sign language DVD called, "Earth: A Theater in God' Universe," which Blake wrote in conjunction with several deaf pastors. This video, a two-hour panorama story of the Great Controversy, is widely circulated across the nation. The Alberta Conference Evangelism Committee voted to supply 200 free copies to deaf people here in Alberta.

Pastor Blake has now become very involved in helping develop deaf ministry in other parts of the world. He is cooperating with Dorothy Watts

of the Southern Asia Division in helping foster 14 full-time deaf ministry workers in India. Blake's are also working to help build churches for the deaf in India. One has already been built, a second is under construction and a third is soon to be purchased.

Blake's have purchased three acres on the edge of Clive, have built their garage, and this spring their builder will start construction of a modest home for them nestled in the trees on their property. They plan to do some gardening, clearing of undergrowth and fallen trees, and planting fruit and other kinds of trees. They will have a nice sun deck to enjoy "sunny Alberta." They plan to enjoy the walking trails in the surrounding area and more birding with their new binoculars.

Their home will become their headquarters for deaf ministry here in Alberta and across Canada and what they hope will become an expanded ministry to deaf beyond what is already started in India and China.

We wish them God's continued blessings as they continue to serve their Lord.


= New Pastors in Our Conference
