


CHIP Ahoy at Calgary Bridgeland!

"Eat as much as you like and lose weight!" No, that's not the main theme of the Coronary Health Improvement Project (CHIP), but that's exactly what happened to many of the participants attending the CHIP seminar during the month of October at the Bridgeland Seventh-day Adventist Church in Calgary, Alberta. The four-week-long seminar, conducted by John and Dorothy Alai, is part of a community-focused program developed by Dr. Hans Diehl, DrHSc, MPH at Loma Linda University.

The main message was clear — "Follow a set of simple lifestyle changes and you could reduce your risk of coronary diseases by more than 50% within just four weeks." Dr. Hans Diehl went through each study carefully, followed by heath tips from other leading doctors and dietitians. John and Dorothy with some help from other CHIP alumni kept the participants motivated with cooking demonstrations and outings to local health food stores. Out of the initial 15 participants, 14 graduated with an average weight loss of 10 pounds as well as appreciable reduction in cholesterol, blood pressure, and blood sugar levels.

Several of the participants who were taking blood pressure medication prior to beginning the program were able to reduce their medication after just four weeks. Others were astonished at the fact they lost an average of 10 pounds during the four weeks, while not reducing their daily intake of food. One of the participants explains, "During the pre-screen test I found out that I was 20 pounds above my ideal weight. I never paid any attention to my weight as I ate all the grains, vegetables and fruit I could eat, drank about eight glasses of water each day, and exercised moderately. When I took the post-screen test, I was shocked to learn that I had lost 12 pounds without even trying."

The secret, if you could call it a secret, is to eat as God intended us to eat. In Genesis 1:29 we read that man's original diet consisted of herbs and fruits. This simple diet has been proven to reduce the risk of heart disease, stroke, diabetes and osteoporosis more than any modern drug or medical procedure. Dr. Hans Diehl's research has shown that through some very simple lifestyle changes, these diseases can be reversed and even completely cured.

Sherwood Park Celebrates Another CHIP Graduation

Another 13 individuals graduated from the Coronary Health Improvement Project (CHIP) program in Sherwood Park on November 1, 2006. Tracy Aguilar, Debbie and Noel Bartley, Gerry Boehm, Dorothy Channell,

Dunfield, David Krill, Gail Hope, Donna Lowry, Judith Paiement, Neall Paterson, Beth Querengesser, and John Tanasichuk received their certificates for having successfully completed the four-week program. They are now part of the 250-member CHIP alumni group in the Edmonton area.

The CHIP program, founded and presented by Dr. Hans Diehl, provides information on adopting lifestyle changes, particularly in the areas of diet and exercise. Making these changes can help decrease risk of heart attack and strokes, lead toward normalizing blood pressure and blood sugar levels, lower cholesterol, reduce weight, and increase the overall quality of life. The program which had its beginnings in 1988 in Creston, BC, came to Alberta in 2001 under the direction of Brian and Christine Simpson at Edmonton South Church. The Sherwood Park Church began working in cooperation with them in 2004.

In 2006 CHIP was endorsed by Capitol Health as a weight-reduction program.

Presenting a program demands a great deal of preparation and involvement, and the sessions are typically staffed by volunteers from both church and commu-

> nity. Sherwood Park member Veronica Dribnenki, a registered nurse, was overall coordinator and facilitator of this year's program working in consultation with Dr. Christine Simpson.

Dribnenki was assisted by Airlie Fowler, nutrition coordinator; Gisela Zinner, hostess coordinator; Carol Dunfield, resource table coordinator; and Lorraine Sorokan, shopping tour guide. Table hosts included Bunty & Albert Nahorney, Karen Waller, Elaine Woytuck-Stiansen, and Troy & Tanya Davis. Results from this year's program

were, as usual, quite dramatic in some individual cases with one person dropping about 50% in cholesterol levels between

A melon bowl prepared by the handle the pre-session heart screen on October 1 and the followup heart screen on October 29. Average results for the group showed an overall drop in total cholesterol of 14 percent. Weight loss averaged eight pounds, and the Body Mass Index averaged a one-point decrease. Daily exercise is a highly promoted component, and during the four weeks the group's exercise equalled walking from Sherwood Park to Kenora, Ontario.

Grades 8/9

We will also be building plant presses and filling them with samples from outside that the students can then examine to learn about different root, stem and leaf types. Later we will be building matchstick/toothpick bridges and testing the student designs for strength.

In Career Technology Studies we are currently building blue bird nest boxes and will be finishing off our picnic table project from last year as well as building CO2 powered dragsters.

As part of my Grade 8/9 Bible class, we have made and served a pancake breakfast to our adopted Grade 1 Class. We will be doing this for other classes as well and we plan to make cookies to send out to places such as the ambulance and fire stations to show our appreciation for what they do.

Every day we had many visitors, and the week ended up with a moving ceremony when 18 precious souls give their hearts to the Lord.



Blessings Crew! -Dale :-)"). He had a humble, unobtrusive philosophy about Christian service. He served with his hands and listened more than he spoke. He recognized people's potential and challenged them to meet it. He never asked more than what he gave.

We, as a church, choose to praise God for the privilege of having Dale in our church family for the past four years. We also praise God because He has beaten death, and He will provide us with Dale's eternal friendship and fellowship. Dale sleeps, waiting for his Saviour, his family and his friends.
