The Relationship Factor

t never fails to happen. My wife and I are just sitting down to dinner and the phone rings. I pick up the receiver expecting to hear the voice of a friend or relative. Instead, I get the voice of a stranger who is trying to sell me something. (Why do they always call at dinner time?) As the persistent telemarketer gives his canned presentation, I can barely listen while I worry about my food getting cold and I desperately look for ways to cut the conversation short.

The caller may have had a terrific offer or even the opportunity of a lifetime, but I will never know because I did not care and was not listening. And I did not listen because his voice joined the chorus of so many other pitches, proposals, and promises that I have heard before. There is simply too much noise – to many voices wanting my attention.

Now suppose that instead of a sales-stranger, the caller was a close friend who wanted to tell me about an important piece of news or a personal breakthrough. I would have listened closely and spoken warmly. I would have been genuinely interested in all that he had to say. Relationship makes all the difference.

The same is true in youth ministry. When adults build relationships with young people, they break through the noise and distortion. Instead of dismissing adults *and* their message by lumping them together with all the other ideas vying for their attention, teens listen carefully because their friends are speaking.

Too often the prevailing attitude in youth ministry is that success is measured in terms of programs – youth rallies, youth-oriented church programs, dramas, cutting edge music, and so on. It is enough to intimidate smaller churches from even trying because they know they lack the resources to pull off these types of programs. But when it comes to relational ministry, it is the smaller churches that have the advantage over the larger ones because they have better ratios of adults to youth.

Life-change occurs in the context of close relationships. High energy programs, drama, music, retreats, youth meetings, and camps can provide tremendous help in the communication process. But it usually takes a *person* to get through. Programs initiate and provide opportunities for relational interaction, but it is the relationships themselves that change lives.

Relational ministry is biblical. God's entire plan for humankind unfolds through relationships. People were created for relationships. All of biblical history records God's relationship with His chosen people. Then God became a person in Jesus Christ to identify us, communicate on our level, and suffer and die for our sins. Now, through faith in Christ, we can enjoy the closest of relationships with God, as His dearly loved children (1 John 3:1-2), born (John 3:3) and adopted (Ephesians 1:5) into his family, and as His bride (Revelation 19:7).

Friendships grow and deepen through shared experiences and mutual respect. Friends find themselves enjoying simply being with each other. They have fun together, often laughing, singing, celebrating, and feasting together. A person will drop everything and rush to a friend in need.

There are no shortcuts, however, to building close friendships. They take time to establish and to build. The need for time is especially true when two people have very little in common, such as an adult and a teenager. Building relationships on this level takes commitment and time – it will not "just happen." To make an impact on young people you must go where they are. Remember, Jesus didn't tell His disciples to wait, put up posters, or hold meetings and then hope people would come. He told them to *go!* That's what relational ministry is all about.



Youth ministry begins when adults find a comfortable method of entering a young person's world and happens as long as adults are able to use their contacts with young people to draw them into a maturing relationship with God through Jesus Christ.



From the President...

Irresistible Christians



I have recently had occasion to see the results that unkind words and actions from church members can have upon others. One of the liabilities of being in administration is that difficult situations often come to your attention with the expectation that you might be able to resolve them. Interestingly enough, as I thought about the effects that unkindness can bring I read a statement from Ellen White in our morning devotional that made me re-examine my own words and behaviors. I'd like to share the entire quotation with you:

"Kind words, pleasant looks, a cheerful countenance, throw a charm around the Christian that makes his influence almost irresistible. This is a way to gain respect, and extend the sphere of usefulness, which costs but little. It is the religion of Christ in the heart that causes the words issuing therefrom to be gentle and the demeanor condescending, even to those in the humblest walks of life. A blustering, faultfinding, overbearing man is not a Christian; for to be a Christian is to be Christlike. . . .

"He who drinks in the spirit of Christ will let it flow forth in kind words, and be expressed in courteous deportment. The plan of salvation is to soften whatever is harsh and rough in the temper, and to smooth off whatever is rugged or sharp in the manners. External change will testify of an internal change. The truth is the sanctifier, the refiner. Received into the heart, it works with hidden power, transforming the receiver. But those who profess the truth and at the same time are rough, and sour, and unkind in words and deportment, have not learned of Jesus; all these manifestations show that they are yet servants of the wicked one. No man can be a Christian without having the spirit of Christ, manifesting meekness, gentleness, and refinement of manners. . . .

"Pleasant, kind, and well-bred Christians will have an influence for God and His truth; it cannot be otherwise. The light borrowed from Heaven will shed its brightening rays through them to the pathway of others. . . . The words we speak, our daily deportment, are the fruit growing upon the tree. If the fruit is sour and unpalatable, the rootlets of that tree are not drawing nourishment from a pure source. If our affections are brought into harmony with our Saviour, if our characters are meek and lowly, we evidence that our life is hid with Christ in God; and we shall leave behind us a bright track. . . . Beholders will discern that we have been with Jesus and learned of Him." Our High Calling p. 238

It takes courage to stand for truth. But perhaps it takes even greater courage to allow truth to sanctify and refine our words and actions. As members of God's remnant people we long to see the "truth" advance. By "kind words, pleasant looks, (and) a cheerful countenance..." we can make our influence for the truth "almost irresistible." My friends, I invite you to join me in pleading with God to make our words and actions acceptable. We've tarried beneath the deceptive banner we like to call individualism too long, excusing our indiscretions as being courageous. Let's allow God's Spirit to make us the loving and lovable Christians that mark His presence in the heart. Oh, to be known as the people who model God's love and kindness!



What is Impact Toronto 2000?

Impact Toronto 2000 is a youth evangelism training event running concurrently with the General Conference session, June 29 - July 8, 2000. Three hundred and fifty young adults from around the world will be trained and actively involved in street evangelism.

The gospel message doesn't have to be preached within the walls of a building. It can and will be proclaimed in the streets of Toronto by the youth of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Who can attend?

Impact Toronto 2000 is for young adults 18-35 years old. We are looking for 350 delegates who have a **passion** for street evangelism. What's important is that you are ready to stand in the **center of God's will** and **join Him** in this **bold adventure!**

Impact Toronto 2000 Logo

The first line in the logo represents the 350 young adults coming to Toronto to be trained for street evangelism. The next line represents the young adults returning to their respective country and homes to share their new ministry skills with others. The person on the end of the third line represents our eventual trip to Heaven to be with our Lord Jesus Christ for eternity.

Lodging, Meals and Transportation

Lodging and Meals

Lodging and meals will be provided for the 10 day event. Please bring your own bedding, as **it will not be provided.**

Transportation

Each delegate is responsible for their own transportation to and from their home and the Toronto training site.

Transportation to and from ministry sites will be provided from June 30 through July 8. Any personal transporation during these dates will be the responsibility of the delegate.

Sponsored Delegates

Step One

Each U.S. conference will select one delegate from among their young adults. As the host country, the SDA Church in Canada will select more than 100 delegates. All delegates must submit an application form to their Conference Youth Director with the non-refundable US\$150 delegate fee attached.

Step Two

The Conference Youth Director must approve the application form. The Youth Director then forwards it to the Union Youth Director/Representative.

Step Three

The Union Youth Director/Representative will also approve each application form. Then mail the application to the Center for Youth Evangelism for the NAD Associate Youth Director to approve.

Each delegate will pay US\$150. Each conference, union and the division will pay US\$250 per delegate. **All fees and applications must be submitted by February 14, 2000.** Applications submitted after this deadline, delegates must pay US\$300. **All delegate, conference, union, and division fees are non-refundable.**

Non-Sponsored Delegate

Step One

Fill out an application form and attach the **non-refundable** US\$900 delegate fee.

Step Two

Then mail your application form to your Conference Youth Director for approval. The Youth Director will mail the form to the Center For Youth Evangelism.

wenty-two thousand Pathfinders and staff from all over the world arrived in cars, buses, vans and even a limousine to participate in the world's largest Adventist youth gathering August 10-14, 1999. The Experimental Aircraft Aviation (EAA) Campground, in Oshkosh Wisconsin, hosted the camporee. Fifty countries helped to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Pathfindering. Alberta had its largest camporee representation to date with 147 attendees.

Highlights of the week included; the mayor of Oshkosh welcoming us to the camporee and to the city of Oshkosh, learning our theme song, working on the mission plane, project word, the Canadian Union participating together for flag lowering, worship, and marching in Friday's parade in downtown Oshkosh, making new friends as we hosted international guests, God's power and intervention, Saturday night fireworks, winning first place in the golf tournament, and the Pinewood Car Derby.



Calgary Central Expansion Plans for modernization and expansion of Calgary Central Sev munity Centre to be built near Calgary Central. Without twenty

enth-day Adventist Church were unveiled on Sabbath, June 19, 1999. The new space will include additional Sabbath School classrooms, enlarged office space, improved handicap access, additional washrooms, a new library and other improvements.

Excitement is running high as the people of Calgary Central witness God's leading in making these plans a reality. Some months ago the church board revisited the idea of a much-needed expansion of the church building which has been discussed off and on for the last fifteen years. Following one particular board meeting Pastor Randy Barber commented, "Wouldn't it be nice if we could also expand this parking lot since we have approximately 120 cars

lining the city streets on Sabbath morning."

A parking lot expansion could happen only if the house next door to Calgary Central went up for sale. A few weeks later the Pastor was surprised to see a "For Sale" sign on that property. This was immediately taken to the church board and it was agreed to make an offer to purchase the property. The offer was \$20,000 less than the asking price. The church prayed, and the offer was accepted without question.

A general business meeting was convened to finalize the purchase and discuss building ideas. Those present, sensing God's leading, decided to go ahead with an expansion. A short while later, the Pastor received a surprise call from the President of the local Community Association. He had heard that Calgary Central had purchased the property to expand the church parking lot. The Community Association faced a dilemma. It was planning a new Com-

munity Centre to be built near Calgary Central. Without twenty additional parking spots, the Community Association could not get a building permit.

A proposition was made: if Calgary Central shared its parking lot on weekday evenings with the new Community Centre, the Centre in turn would provide Calgary Central access to its lot on weekends. Further, the Association would support and expedite the necessary approval process for the parking lot expansion and church renovations/expansion. Clearly God leads!

The building program was launched with a special day of spiritual renewal. The presenter for the adult Sabbath School was Elder Norman Yergen, of the Alberta Conference. Elder Henry Feyerabend of "It Is Written" delivered the sermon, "How Much Will It Cost?" After a festive luncheon, members enjoyed an organ recital by guest artist, Donna Holoboff. She performed works by Handel and Mozart as well as some hymn transcriptions. Walter Wright, pastor of Calgary Central in the mid 1960's honored us with his presence and his own personal pledge toward the building program.

Fund-raising plans are being carried out in various ways to reach our goal of \$700,000. Children, along with adults, have taken home little church coin banks to fill during the week, to be returned to the church when filled.

Praise God for his leading, for the contributions of many church members and for answered prayers. To God be the glory and praise as Calgary Central takes on a new look as well as new souls for Christ.


