icture with me a table, in a humble home in the year 1850. Around the table sits six or seven people who have come to do some earnest praying and planning.

The youngest is 18 years old, just a child we might think. The oldest is James White, he's way up there at 29. What are these people planning? The best method for sharing their convictions and the message that God has given them to give? They aren't a bit satisfied to just start up a church for themselves to worship in and meet their own personal needs. They are thinking much bigger. They are wanting to know how to carry this message to the entire world!

Well, it's happening. They are, of course, long since passed away, but we live to carry on what they started. The message they were concerned about is now circling the globe. People are excited about that message and joining by the thousands every day. But, it seems as though the Holy Spirit is shifting things into overdrive.

Recently my wife and I had the privilege of attending Seeds '97, a church planting event at Andrews University. Organized by the North American Division Evangelism Institute, this meeting brought in 450 people from North America, England, Australia, New Zealand and other places in the world. Never in our experience had we seen or enjoyed such spiritual enthusiasm. I went wondering what it was going to be like, and left feeling like a tidal wave is sweeping through the church, and we can either be on it, or washed away by it.

Ron and Donna Willey, a dentist and his wife from Illinois, told of how they began to talk to their receptionist about the Bible and had a three way Bible discussion once a week. She wanted her husband to join so he came. That brought in a couple more and so on until they started having a weekly service right in his office. One thing led to another, and now there are 35 members and 70 people attending every week, and they own their own building. The exciting thing is that of those 70 people, not one is an Adventist church member from another church that has come to help. This church is strictly made of former Adventists who weren't attending church, or brand new members. Ron pastors the church, and has trained three others to pastor certain aspects of church life. It is truly a church led by laymen. This is only one of several stories we heard and were blessed by all week.

In the 1890's in North America there was a new church started for every pastor every year. Did you know that in the 1990's there's a new church started for every 124 pastors? The church planting movement began to go downhill after the death of Ellen White, when pastors began to stay resident and pastor specific churches, something she had spoken against. She encouraged lay leaders to look after churches, so that pastors could continue to raise up churches.

Between June of 1996 until August of 1997, in North America, at least 136 new churches have been started. That is a number unprecedented in decades. The record is the year 1900, when there were 394 new churches begun. Judging by the commitment and excitement expressed by the people at Seeds '97, it's only just begun. On the last night, Russell Burrill, organizer of Seeds '97, made an appeal for all those who felt the call of God to became actively involved in planting new churches to come forward. The few who remained seated were not front liners but were dedicated to support in other ways.

Centuries ago, Jesus said the harvest was ripe, it was the lack of reapers that was slowing things down. It's time we take His concern seriously, and ask Him what He wants us to do. Heaven is ready, the Holy Spirit is ready, people are responding and churches are springing up everywhere. Will we let this pass us by? No! 

From the President ...

Unexpected Courage

 ■ ater, Joseph of Arimathea asked Pilate for the body of Jesus. Now Joseph was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly because he feared the Jews. With Pilate's permission, he came and took the body away." John 19:38 NIV

We don't know too much about Joseph of Arimathea; this is the only story where his name is mentioned in the



We also know that he was a disciple of Jesus—but within limits: he was a disciple secretly. Earlier (after Jesus healed the man who was blind from birth) the Jewish leaders had announced that anyone who acknowledged Jesus would lose their membership at the synagogue. Apparently Joseph, who was himself a member of the council, didn't have the courage to openly identify himself with Jesus and His cause. Or perhaps he felt that he could do more good for the cause by remaining in his position on the council. (It is true that Luke tells us Joseph was not among those who consented to Jesus' death and Ellen White explains that he and Nicodemus were not called to that late night - early morning meeting where Jesus was condemned because it was known among the council that they would question the legitimacy of what had been decided by the others.) Yet he believed in his heart and John is comfortable in calling him a disciple.

But we also know that when it really mattered, Joseph openly identified himself with Jesus. Interestingly, the Scriptures say that it was Joseph (not even Nicodemus who had secretly visited with Jesus at night) who went to Pilate asking that he be allowed to care for the body of Jesus. We had not heard of Joseph previous to this request. We are told in Acts that later a large number of even the priests and rulers became followers of Jesus. But Joseph (and then Nicodemus, who apparently gained courage from Joseph's action) was the first to openly declare himself for Jesus and identify himself as believing in Him. He seems to have made that declaration while even the 11 apostles were cowering in fear (and Peter was regretting his open denial of Jesus).

In this story I find myself both challenged and encouraged. I am challenged to ask myself if I would have had the courage to openly identify myself with Jesus under those circumstances. I long to think I would have, but even the disciples failed that test. What makes me think I would fare any better than did they? But two members of the ruling council, who had more to lose than nearly anyone, were willing to make that sacrifice under the most demanding of circumstances. There was no popularity to be gained; no crowds to please by their decision. Only courage to follow their convictions! By God's grace I want to find that kind of courage!

I am encouraged by this story, however, to see that when things in God's cause seem to be the most discouraging, God has faithful men and women who will step in to fill the needs that exist. As we look to the final conflict that will bring the most difficult circumstances in the history of God's people, God will prevail. Even when those we expected to be faithful will prove untrue, God's cause will not fail. (The needs will be met—often, perhaps, by ones we would never have suspected as sympathetic to God's cause.) And as those unexpected sympathizers demonstrate their courage, others will follow their example and a rich harvest will be ready for Jesus' return to this earth!

Summer Camp Ministries Report

hanks be to God for an exciting, safe, and successful summer of camp ministry at Foothills Camp! Special thanks are in order for the fine young people who staff our

Camp. We are truly blessed to have such a group of positive young people willing to spend their summer in ministry of this nature.

Our camper numbers increased marginally this summer, from 320 to 335. Registrations for our camp program indicated 57% SDA's, 43% from other or no identified denomination. In addition to the increase in numbers, and the reintroduction of the Sherwood Forest Camp, a special challenge including hosting a Pathfinder group from Texas. This group came for five nights during our Blind and Adventure Camps. Foothills provided meals and accommodations, while the group spent their days sight-seeing in Alberta. They were an excellent group, but certainly provided a logistical challenge!

The camp program challenged campers to "accept Jesus as the answer." It was a call to

which 95% of the campers responded positively! It is exciting to participate in a program with that kind of positive impact in the

lives of young people. The camp atmosphere provided a powerful impact on the camp staff themselves. Five were re-baptized, and one staff made the baptismal commitment for the first time. This positive atmosphere culminated during our Teen Camp—which saw two of our campers baptized on the final Sabbath. It was a powerful week of ministry, and impact in the lives of teens—special thanks to Pastor Lee and Jolynn Gugliotto.

This year saw significant improvements in a number of areas: Advertising; BMX track improvements and four bikes purchased; horse herd greatly improved; a significant investment in new rider helmets; new life jackets for canoeing; more tumbling mats; the construction of Sherwood Forest; and state of the art group initiative materials were provided. These improvements were made within the context of our budget, made possible in part by income gener-

ated from the Pathfinder group visiting from Texas. Additional improvements on the grounds included a new Primary building, new sidewalks, improved roads, two new washing machines, and a new heating element for the pool. Needless to say, it was a busy summer completing these improvements.

Even with these improvements, Foothills Camp recognizes the need to continue to improve its level of service and care. Part of this has been realized by asking each Foothills user to evaluate us. We've received a positive response, and information which will help us fine tune the camp program. One significant change to watch for will be a modified camp calendar, with specialized camps coming earlier in the summer.

This facility with its 32 beds in four cabins, self contained cook house, and group building elements provides an excellent enhancement to our camp program. Many young people will take advantage of this special camping experience that only Sherwood Forest can provide.

In addition to its role as a summer camp facility, Sherwood Forest will be used by Pathfinder Groups, and for Teen and Youth camping experiences. Sherwood Forest includes many initiative elements; trust fall, balance beam, inclined balance beam, footloops, tire pole, swinging log, climbing net, all aboard platform and more. Each of these elements provide the opportunity for personal accomplishment, team building, and group discussion. The experience of tackling these challenges creates excellent opportunities for spiritual growth as well as character development.

Sherwood Forest was constructed by

camp staff during June, with hands on leadership provided by Wolfram Hackenberg. The buildings were designed and built to last for years, with minimum maintenance. The elements have been built with safety nets, and plenty of wood chips, to ensure the safety of those participating. The construction of the facility has cost close to \$26,000 - including labor. The funds were provided by a previous insurance settlement, a significant donation of over \$7000, camp operating, and numerous other donations. Thank you to all who have supported the vision - for many years to come your gift will play a significant role in building our young people.

As we look forward, a vision for further development of Sherwood Forest is in place. A high elements initiative course, complete with safety equipment, will provide an excellent facility for our older youth. This type of course will particularly appeal to those ages 15 and up. This is an age group we have failed to provide adequately for in the past. Can we do something special and significant for them now?

Facilities like this will provide us as a Church, to train our young people to be that "army" Sister White talks about, "With such an army of workers as our youth, rightly trained, might furnish, how soon the message of a crucified, risen, and soon-coming Saviour might be carried to the whole world!" *Christian Service page 30, 31.* Our



London, England—The Seventh-day Adventist Church added its voice to the many others expressing sadness and regret at the tragic death of Diana, Princess of Wales. In a message of condolence sent August 31 to the Queen and all members of the Royal Family, the president of the Adventist Church in Britain, Cecil Perry, spoke of the church leaders and members shock and sadness at the news. "Our hearts go out at this time to those closest to the Princess who are experiencing grief and bereavement. We will be asking all our members to pray specially for the Princess' children. In a response received the same day from Balmoral castle, the Queen's Private Secretary expressed the Royal Family's gratitude. "The Queen, the Prince of Wales, Prince William, Prince Henry and all the members of the Royal Family are most grateful for your thoughtful expression of sympathy on the sudden and tragic death of Diana, Princess of Wales. The Private Secretary has been asked to thank you for your kindness in writing as you did at such a sad time."

I have come to the conclusion that too many
Christians in general, and Adventists are not exempt, are educated in the facts and truth
of discipleship, but not held accountable as to whether or not they obey what they are
taught. I am guilty of that as a pastor preparing people for baptism. It's easier to sit and
go through a series of Bible studies on Christianity, than it is to slow down and
encourage the application of that truth in the disciple's life. Too many disciples are
educated beyond their obedience.

For example, when a person is invited to accept Jesus Christ as savior, the depth of that truth needs to be explored, accepted, and experienced. The communication with God through prayer should not only be taught, but modeled until the disciple "gets it." The truth of the second coming is a fact that needs to be prepared for. The beauty of the Sabbath is much more than the recognition that sunset Friday to sunset Saturday is the Bible Sabbath. New disciples need to experience the joy of Sabbath rest. The doctrine of spiritual gifts needs to be taught individually so that people know how to serve God.

To be educated beyond obedience is a curse to the disciple, and a frustration to the one doing the discipling. Many reading these words will inwardly admit that they know more than they are doing, and believe more than they are experiencing. This is why the church lacks power, and this power shortage can only be overcome as we first look to Christ as a model for us as disciples, then be a true follower and do as He says.
